

Head Start/ Early Head Start Annual Report

The program Year 2020-2021





Originally founded in 1927 by All Saints' Episcopal Church to provide social welfare programs for the poor, elderly, sick, and "those who might otherwise be forgotten", ECS expanded its scope in 1954 to provide programs to address the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of all San Diegans. ECS was incorporated in 1955 and obtained its first government contract with San Diego County to provide counseling and jobs for men released from prison. Today, ECS provides services in the areas of homelessness, mental health, poverty, addiction, and early childhood education.

Head Start and Early Head Start

ECS Head Start and Early Head Start are child development programs serving children from birth to age five, pregnant women, and their families. More than 20 locations throughout the South Bay region of San Diego, including home-based programs, deliver child-focused programs with the overall goal of increasing the school readiness of young children in low-income families. Program benefits include a range of individualized services in the areas of education and early childhood development; medical, dental, and mental health; nutrition; and parent involvement. ECS Head Start and Early Head Start are federally funded through a from the Office of Head Start, Administration for Children and Families, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, through a delegate agreement with Neighborhood House Association.

2020-2021 Head Start and Early Head Start Year in Review

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic the 2020-2021 ECS Head Start continued to pivot to meet the needs of children, families, and staff. For the health and safety of children and staff services continued to be delivered predominantly remote.

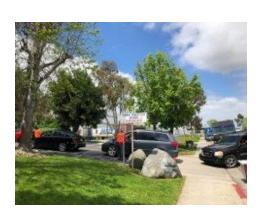

Nutrition Services

Even though services to children remained predominantly virtual, ECS continued to provide nutritious meals to enrolled children via meal distributions. On average ECS provided 3,000 meals/ week and 1,500 meals/ week to enrolled children.









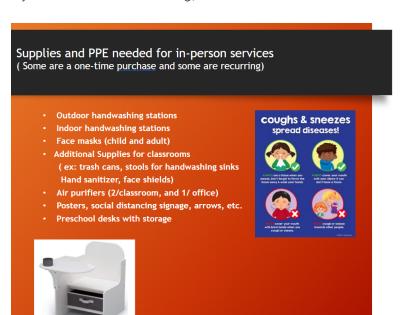


Efforts to Prepare Children for Kindergarten:

2020–2021 was an atypical school year due to the COVID–19 pandemic. Due to health and safety concerns, education services were predominantly delivered virtually. The ECS Head Start Program utilized CARES funding that was provided to support services that were impacted by the Covid 19 Pandemic to purchase supplies and subscriptions for children and staff to support education and remote services (depicted below).



As vaccines became available to staff, a few centers began to pilot in-person services with many modifications including, but not limited to new health and safety protocols, reduced



class sizes, meal time modifications (outdoor mealtime to increase air circulation). Additional health and safety supplies were also purchased to support the return to safe in-person services (depicted left).



Classroom Environmental Changes During Pandemic:







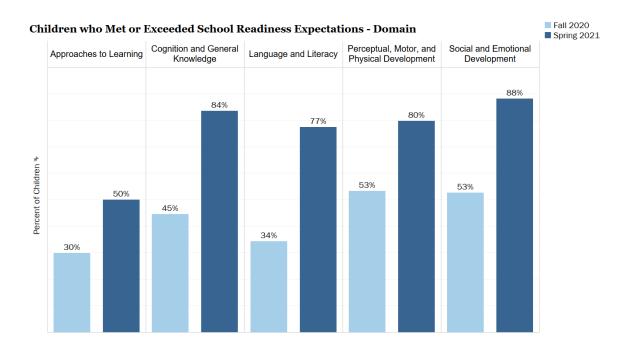


Whether the children were receiving in–person or virtual services, the teaching staff continued to gather developmental observations. Observations were gathered in a variety of ways including but not limited to ZOOM observations, parent reports, child work samples, and in–class observations (for children who began to attend in–person)

To track Child Development and SchoolReadiness ECS Head Start/ Early Head Start utilizes the Desired Results Developmental Profile 2015 (DRDP 2015) Assessment which was developed by the California Department of Education (CDE). The DRDP 2015 is a revised tool from the DRDP 2010, which was previously used to assess Head Start and Early Head Start children. The revised tool represents a developmental continuum to assess all children in infancy to Kindergarten, including children with identified learning disabilities. The tool incorporates more developmental measures for teachers to assess and utilize to measure child growth.

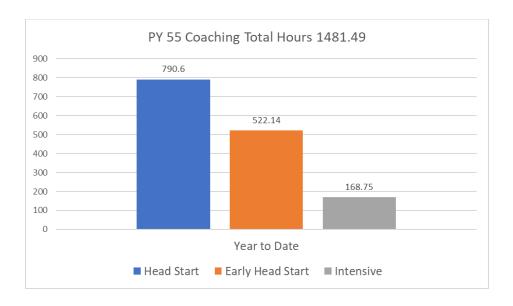


Fall 2020/ Spring 2021 DRDP Comparisons For K Bound Preschoolers:



Coaching:

ECS Head Start continued to provide staff development and practice—based coaching to teaching staff during the 2020–2021 program year. Coaching sessions were conducted virtually, and new topics included, but not limited to accessing and navigating new virtual teaching platforms, teaching in a virtual environment were added to support teaching staff in getting children ready for kindergarten.











In addition to one-one coaching sessions, teaching staff participated in Together and Learning Communities (TLC) throughout the program year.

Parent Involvement:

During the 2020-2021 program year parent involvement was key to participating in the Head Start / Early Head Start program, however, it looked much different than in prior years. Children were provided tablets so that they could log into a small group and individual sessions with their teachers. Home Based enrollees participated in virtual home visits with Home Visitors. Parents were pivotal in logging their children in, attending one-one sessions, and providing samples of children's work and observations to teachers.

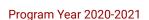
Parents went to centers during specific times to pick up supplies and activities. One example is a gardening activity. Families were provided with seeds, soil, and home-center activity packets that aligned with the lesson plan that teachers were also doing.













Even though families were not coming daily to centers or visiting weekly, in-person with home visitors, ECS family services staff continued to maintain ongoing and consistent communication with families either via phone, video chat, text or email. Families were still offered the opportunity to participate in virtual parent meetings, attend training, and meet with family services staff to determine individual strengths, needs, and to participate in the goal setting process.

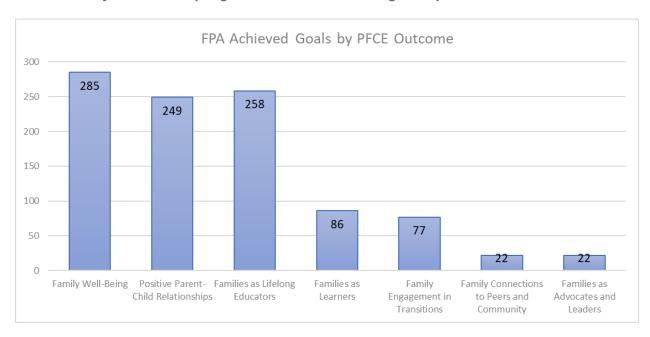

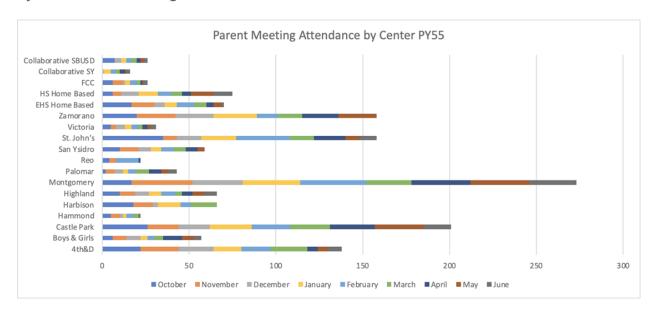

Data collection date May 19th - June 10th 2021

In the Spring of 2020, parents of children enrolled in our program were invited to complete a feedback survey. The protective factors survey asked questions that gave us a better idea on any changes families had since they joined the program as well as hardships they have recently experienced. A total of 180 feedback responses were received, all anonymous.

Parents were asked to answer questions comparing their experience before joining Head Start to their situation at present. The majority of respondents, 47%, have been in the program between 1 and 2 years. Overall, parents reported what is interpreted as better parent-child interactions, more positive outlook, and increased social support. (Response summary in chart below)

Most recent review by the Secretary:

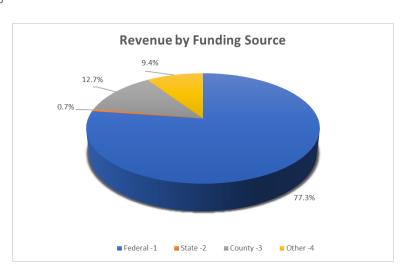

2020-2021 Audit update

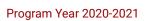

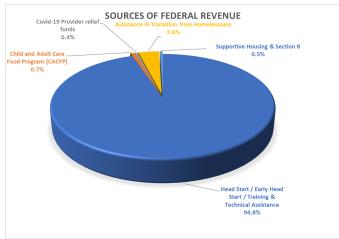

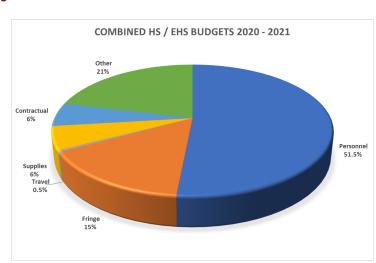
